School News


<u>Author Talk – A.M. Dassau</u>

Reception - Rosen

Phonics and Reading

Class Rosen have had a busy half-term. Children have been taking part in regular reading sessions using their phonics skills and have been amazing the adults with their progress.

Colour-Mixing and Observational Drawing

We have been learning all about naming animal body parts, we have investigated more about nocturnal animals. In addition to this, children have also been working on developing their colour mixing skills and their observational drawing by making some self-portraits.









Maths

In maths, children have been exploring the properties of shapes and are beginning to recognise composition of simple numbers.

Christmas Nativity

We have been learning about Christmas as a Christian celebration and we explored building nativity scenes and churches in our provision. The children also put on a spectacular Nativity performance for the school and their parents/carers.

Family Book Time

Class Rosen have also enjoyed a visit from the library services, who came to deliver a wonderful and hilarious story session. Thank you to all of the parents/carers who attended, and to those who attended the reading workshop which focused upon supporting the children to read their reading books at home







Year 1 – Murphy

Computing

The children have been working hard to apply their newly learnt paint skills. This has included using the paint brush, rubber, paint can to fill and experimenting with creating a range of shapes. The children have created their own art work in the style of range of artists such as Mondrian, Matisse, Kandinsky and Seurat. The children examined the art work and used the paint app to replicate these. The children used real paint to compare which types of painting they liked best – using technology or using a paintbrush.

Geography

In Autumn 1.2, Year 1's Murphy class has been actively engaging in Geography by exploring simple maps and the concept of routes. The children highlighted a simple route to school, learning what a route entails and its significance in everyday life. To support their understanding, they created a bird's eye view of our classroom, working in pairs and small groups. This hands-on activity encouraged teamwork and rich oracy discussions, allowing the children to articulate their thoughts and ideas, thereby supporting their learning.









Letters & Sounds


Year 1 children have been working incredibly hard in their Letters and Sounds sessions! The children have been learning a range of new Phase 5 GPCs, including both digraphs and split digraphs. The children are continuing the learn that digraphs can make many different sounds. Year 1 are challenging themselves to read and write sentences containing their newly learnt GPCs, as well as tricky words. The children have shown their confidence in matching pictures to words, as striving to improve their letter formation.

Guided Reading

In guided reading, the children are continuing to learnt three main skills. These are decoding: to sound out words. Prosody: to add expression to their reading by changing their voice, and comprehension: to answer questions about what they have read and provide their opinion. Can your children read the sentence out loud? Can your child identify the digraphs and trigraphs? Is there any punctuation in the sentence?








Year 2 - Bryon & Donaldson

Geography

For geography this term, children have been using maps. They have practised finding routes using digital mapping tools, created their own maps from a bird's-eye perspective, and taken a walk around the school grounds to observe how different locations relate to one another.









Art

This term's art unit has focused on the work of Henri Matisse. The children explored collage techniques using cutting and tearing skills to create their own expressive pieces. They also learned about the art of overlapping and applied this skill in their sketching as well

PΕ

In PE this term, the children have been focusing on gymnastics. They have learned a variety of balances and rolls, and have worked collaboratively to create their own gymnastic routines. They have also been practising giving and receiving constructive feedback to help refine and improve each other's performances







Writing

Year 2 have been working really hard this half term from writing descriptions in English. We have been really delving into writing descriptions of our class novel's main characters – The Twits! We have tried to use our senses to produce some really well-written descriptions along with using great adjectives to up-level our writing.

<u>Science</u>

In science lessons, we have learnt about the seasons and the difference between a weather forecast and the climate. We have been looking at which symbols correlate with each different type of weather in order to record it correctly on our own weather record. The children have found learning how to make shadows and learning about how shadows are made very interesting.

<u>Year 3/4 – Dahl, Rowling & Morpurgo</u>

Severn Trent Assembly and Workshops

The children in year 3/4 had an assembly and participated in workshops delivered by Severn Trent Water. The children learnt about how they can save water, and about how water is treated by Severn Trent before it reaches our homes. Children looked at different scenarios focusing upon how two families used water for their daily activities. Children were then encouraged to think about the different ways in which they could save water.







Design and Technology

In Design and Technology, year 3/4 have learnt how to cross-stitch, stitching sequences, stitch on buttons and practice their tacking skills. All of the children produced fantastic pieces of work









Science

In Science, we have learnt about the animals in different habitats and the threat humans can cause to their habitat such as deforestation and plastic pollution. We have also learnt about how animals can be classified, and the children then created their own classification keys.





<u>Year 3/4 – Dahl, Rowling & Morpurgo</u>

Geography

In geography, the children have learnt about the symbols that they can find on an ordnance survey map. We have also been learning about 4-digit and 6-digit references, and we have learnt about the difference between the UK, Britain and the British Isles whilst comparing the physical features between the UK and Europe.







Abstract Printing

During a, we have been experimenting with abstract art and looking at some strange works of art. We experimented with printing using different tools to create different patterns. Using the tools, we created abstract bowls of fruit.







Salt Dough Recipe

Salt Dough Recipe - Make sure to ask an adult first!

2 cups all-purpose (plain) flour 1 cup fine table salt Up to 1 cup warm water

Mix to make a dough and then create shapes of your choice.

Oven bake: An adult needs to place the shapes on a baking sheet and bake in a preheated oven at its lowest setting (around 200°F/90°C to 250°F/120°C) for 1-2 hours or until completely hard and dry. Thicker items will take longer to bake.



<u>Year 5 – Rauf & Zephaniah</u>

PE

In PE we have been looking at 'Dance Through the Ages.' Focusing on different styles of dance throughout the 20th century. The children have looked at using choreography to create a sequence and how to recognise good timing, execution and performance skills.

Art

The children have been creating Mayan masks using clay in relation to a previous History unit. They enjoyed exploring different designs and then creating their own. We used the score and slip method to add features onto our masks.









RE

In RE children are looking at how new life is welcomed into the word by different religions. They enjoyed learning about it as well as sharing their own opinions and beliefs.

English

This term, we have been reading 'Wreck of the Zanzibar' by Michael Morpurgo and our literacy and reading lessons have focused on this book. Our first write was a diary entry, then we looked at setting descriptions of a storm!

We have looked at metaphors, similes and personification in our descriptions when thinking about the effect on the reader. Finally, we looked at Leatherback Turtles which led us to our final write- a non-chronological report.

Year 6 - Almond & Blackman

Visit to Bletchley Park

Year 6's visited Bletchley Park this term as part of their history topic and learning about WW2. Whilst there, they learnt about decoding the German messages in order to win the war. A major breakthrough that took place at the park itself by a large team of carefully chosen intellects. Most of them were selected from Oxford and Cambridge universities as well as people who had fast problem-solving skills and knew the German language fluently.

The children were fascinated by the enigma machine and also how the morse code worked. On return to school, they added to their non-chronological report for the War.








Computing

The children in Year 6 have been working to create their own webpages. The involved using the websites Google Sites and Google Slides. The children also used PowerPoint in the planning stages.

The children have learnt about how to consider copyright and how to gain permission for content that features on their website. The children studied the San Diego Zoo website as an example of what an interactive website looks like.





PE


During our PE lessons, the children in year 6 have been developing their team building skills so that they are able to work together effectively and communicate clearly to one another.


Recommended Reads - Staff

Reception, Year 1 & Year 2 Mrs Patel recommends: We're Going on a Bear Hunt by Michael Rosen

'We're Going on a Bear Hunt' is a children's story about a family who set out on a journey to find a bear and on the way, they face obstacles like tall grass, a deep river and a snowstorm. The story is great as it's an adventurous trek of challenges with repetitive phrases which can be acted out.

Mrs Patel thinks this book is a fantastic way of helping children to remember a story in a fun and engaging way through repetition using expression, actions and voice intonation. There is suspense and adventure which the family are able to enjoy together.





Reception, Year 1 & Year 2 Miss Kaur recommends: Beegu by Alexis Deacon

When Beegu lands on planet Earth, Beegu has to search for a friend.

Miss Kaur thinks that Beegu's story helps us all think about how important it is to be friendly and kind and be a helper of others.

Year 3 & Year 4 Miss Purewal recommends: The Iron Man by Ted Hughes

The Iron Giant is a classic story about an enormous, mysterious, metal robot who is appears out of nowhere and has begun to consume bits of barbed wire and tractors – the farmers are terrified and unsure of what to do. Only a brave, young farm boy named Hogarth has the courage to lead the robot back to safety and to save everyone when another danger lurks in the shadows.

This story is beautifully written and highlights how we should appreciate our Earth.

Now Percy and his friends have just ten days to catch the true lightning thief and stop all-out war from erupting on Mount Olympus.


Mrs Chelley recommends this book because it is where myths meet a 'normal' world. It is packed full of action.



Good Things from Farms by Catherine Baker



Ridhan – Year 2: Donaldson




Recommended Reads - Children


Horrid Henry - Underpants Panic by Francesca Simon


In this book Horrid Henry is trying to play a trick on Perfect Peter!

Christmas Holiday Activites

During the Christmas holidays, make sure to get outdoors and get some fresh air. There is a lot more to do than just sit in front of a screen! Here are some activities that you might want to try...

Paper Snowflakes

Cutting Christmas snowflakes involves folding a square piece of paper into a triangle, then into thirds (or sometimes halves), creating a pointed shape, and then snipping various shapes (like triangles, curves, and notches) into the edges.



Winter Walk

A lot of changes happen to our environment during the winter. Go for a walk and try to spot things that you can see changing.

Bird Feeder

Birds struggle to find food in colder months, so making your own bird-feeder will make sure that the birds who visit your garden manage to get food during the colder months.

You can make a bird-feeder from household items like plastic bottles or milk cartons, cut holes, fill with food and hang them from a tree.
